This survey was carried out by Holyport Residents Association to measure opinion for the RBWM Edge of Settlement Analysis. Responses were received from 513 people, 226 being online and 287 by paper. At the time this represented 18.1% of the Holyport area population.

As the normal response rate to consultations / elections is less than 4% this gives a measure of how seriously people took this consultation.

Area 7A was Lodge Farm. Area 5C was the area bounded by A330, A308(M) and M4.

Following is a summary of responses relevant to Lodge Farm using the question numbers on the results sheet;

cannot be relied on by RBWM. We asked Holyport residents how they would answer. This question was only asked in the online survey (226 respondents)

77.4% said they would not vote for any areas to be developed.

16.4% said they would vote for areas other than 7A or 5C

5.8 % said they would vote for development on Area 5C

0.4% said they would vote for development on Area 7A

From the survey results it is clear that HRA's primary duty in representing the views of Holyport residents has to be to argue against any development on Areas 7A and 5C.

Comments Received

Any further comments as to what it would mean to you to lose this Green Belt area? (7A)

Having lived in Holyport for over 30 years and enjoyed its semi-rural nature, any further housing would utterly destroy the separate identity of Holyport. I do not consider myself as part of Maidenhead. We already suffer from speeding traffic and localised congestion, especially by parents taking and fetching children from Holyport School. Further housing in the area would add to this problem and make life very unpleasant indeed.

I live on the A308 and traffic is horrendous, especially when traffic is diverted off the M4 for roadworks and heavily laden articulated lorries pass by my house. It feels like an earthquake is occurring. I would not be surprised at all if in the future part of the road collapses under the weight. It may be an A road but it is in very bad condition with cracks and potholes a plenty. The last time the A308 was resurfaced the Council didn't re-tarmac the road they just crushed stones into the surface - not sure what this process is called. I have complained about the lorries in the past but was told that there was nothing that could be done. One lane should be left open and lorries made to stay on the motorway. Therefore, my opinion is that, any increase in traffic would be a nightmare for the area!

The historical value of this site cannot be overstated enough. A WW1 prisoner of war camp was here! It's an area of historical significance.

I don't want to live in an extension of Maidenhead. Green Belt was a vision for the future and should be respected as such.

We do not have enough Green Belt around Holyport. Enough housing estates have already been built in a small village. With climate change we must urgently stop building on green belt land.

Having lived in Holyport practically all of my life I have first hand experience of how living conditions have deteriorated through over development (i.e. over population).

Houses will be continuous from Maidenhead to Holyport - We would be joined - Not a village anymore.

I feel the whole integrity of Holyport as a village would be lost. To build on these areas would mean that Holyport just becomes a suburb to Maidenhead.

A lot of wildlife live here, i.e. rabbits, deer, birds etc....

I have ticked that some development would be good but it must be very limited bearing in mind the above points especially the effect on flooding as we are experiencing at the moment in our area due to building above towards Ascot. It does not strike me as the most amazing Green Belt area under the circumstances of other needs for the area. Traffic volume already is a major problem especially with the current state of roads, potholes etc. and flooding has exacerbated this problem. Any future development on Lodge Farm will only make this worse.

Who would be sane to even suggest additional development in Holyport with the current level of traffic in Non-Peak hours. Already during peak hours, it could take me up to 30 minutes to get out Springfield Park to Windsor Road... That's absolute madness to suggest that Holyport can sustain additional population. In addition, we have in the past experienced blocked drainage issues...It is true it wasn't severe, but imagining additional strain on existing systems in Holyport will definitely cause great problems all over. Prior to thinking of any new housing development, it would be great to recognise the limitation of current infrastructure... upgrade it... and when it copes... then maybe... maybe... we should consider additional housing developments...! I am strongly opposed to additional population... Full Stop.

I recognise that there is a need for sheltered accommodation in Holyport. I'd prefer it didn't happen on this site however at most a development of 10 bungalows for the elderly opposite Stroud Farm lane would be acceptable - as the location is near to the shops with flat access. This would have a minimal impact on traffic and release housing stock for families. The field seems to be the one place that locals can walk their animals and allow them off their leads to exercise. Otherwise Holyport Green and the school fields could potentially become that territory with issues of fouling.

The name would change to Maidenhead East which we do not like.

OF PARTICULAR CONCERN IS THE RISK OF FLOODING/GROUNDWATER FOR BOTH NEW AND EXISTING PROPERTIES; ANYONE VIEWING THE RECENT TV COVERAGE OF FLOODING IN BERKSHIRE AND SURROUNDING AREAS CANNOT FAIL TO BE WORRIED ABOUT THE EFFECTS OF FLOODING; BUILDING ON THE FLOOD PLAIN SHOULD STOP AND I LOOK FORWARD TO HEARING RBWM REINFORCE THE TELEVISED PROMISE MADE THIS WEEK TO PREVENT FURTHER DEVELOPMENT OF THE FLOOD PLAIN......

This land should be used for farming, grazing or Equestrian use. Animals need a home too. To lose yet more Green Belt land to a concrete jungle is a crime. Many children don't even know where their food comes from, showing them that land can be used only as housing is not the solution. We all need land to live, not just a home.

I don't live in Maidenhead town because I value the green areas around Holyport. Filling these in destroys the feel of Holyport, and I might as well live in central Maidenhead. Filling the areas with houses gives all the downside of living in central Maidenhead, with none of the benefits (e.g. close to station)

The community who have invested their time, money and effort freely in this area do so because it has a 'village community feel'. This will be lost to both the existing and expanded community when it hits the tipping point of no longer 'feeling like a village'. The opportunity cost of the overall negative impact on daily life in our homes, on the streets, in the schools, and in the commercial establishments of Holyport substantially outweighs the potential positive impact to additional residents who push it over the tipping point.

Increased traffic would pose a greater risk to pedestrians and cyclists and also significantly increase commuting journey times (which would increase carbon emissions due to gridlock) with a resulting negative impact on the economy.

We feel very strongly that productive agriculture should be safeguarded.

We consider ourselves residents of Holyport Village and not Maidenhead town. This is why we chose to live in Holyport as we like the village feel. Further, the traffic on the roads through Holyport is already at maximum capacity. ANY additional cars on the roads would cause permanent gridlock at peak hours.

The risk of increased flooding is a concern to existing housing. We have already seen this year Langworthy Lane flooded again, the water currently flows in the direction of 7A and building on this area can only act as a hindrance to the flow and draining. Holyport still has a village feel about it and building on 7A will join Holyport onto Maidenhead. If I had wanted to live in Maidenhead then I would have bought a house in Maidenhead and not in a nearby village.

My entry into Ascot Road would be severely prejudiced by the extra loading of traffic coming from any development on this land. The motorway - apart from local roads - cannot cope with extra traffic. Noise and pollution. Lighting at night. Destruction of trees.

It forms a necessary gap between the M4/Maidenhead and the village, which would be unable to cope with the increased traffic wanting access to the M4.

We strongly believe that despite ever-present pressure to build housing, we must ensure that access to countryside and open space is available to the next and future generations. We also believe it is vital to maintain green areas around all built up areas to assist in managing ground-water in both flood and drought situations.

Populations rise and fall, but once land is built on it's lost. Green Belt should never be built on, there are many other options.

Open spaces are vital for the well-being of a community. As it is, there are few enough of these open spaces in Holyport and for that reason alone, we should not infill wherever there is a plot of land. Also, I feel extremely strongly that wild life should be allowed to exist alongside people. With the pressure on land in this area, some species are struggling - I have noticed that there are fewer birds around and rarely do I see hares nowadays when out walking.

Why did we ever bother having a Green Belt area if you lot were going to build on it!

The reason I bought a house in Holyport was for the fact it was a lovely village and does not need more residents. With the new high school being built this will add to traffic issues in the area. Add more residents and it could take over 30 min just to get onto the M4 between 7.30am and 9am which is not acceptable. This is not about affordable housing but greed. They would not be proposing this if there was not good profit in it.

Further housing in the area would add to this problem and make life very unpleasant indeed.

I do support building here.

Living so close to traffic and a spot area of high pollution is hardly a healthy option.

Such ill thought out developments including 7A do not consider the substantial increase in traffic flow from all roads leading to and leaving Braywick roundabout. Additionally with limited footpath and no additional provision for cyclists, risk to life will leave a legacy that future generations will need to resolve with probably limited funds and more importantly limited scope to solve the problems.

Just sounds too dreadful.

The same comments as above - village would no longer exist.

Using for a hospital is useful for the area, and perhaps the St Marks Hospital area could be redeveloped in a residential area for some of the housing required for the RBWM.

Traffic congestion is a major problem. Any accident on the M4 and the traffic spills back onto local roads. If a hospital were built traffic grid locking will become a regular occurrence. How would patients get to appointments on time? Siting an A & E department in this location would be a disaster as traffic congestion would prevent patients presenting within the "golden hour". Usage of the Air ambulance would dramatically be required for the ambulance service to hit current targets. Once Green Belt is gone it will never be regained.

A lot of wildlife live here, i.e. rabbits, deer, birds etc...

This open space is virtually the first such area on the M4 out from London. It gives a real feeling of entering the countryside after the large London urban spread. Its loss would mean that the surrounding towns and villages would just merge into the London sprawl. There are other less attractive areas to use for building of any kind. Definite NO to a hospital there!

If the above flooding problems could be addressed and traffic flow affecting Holyport I would still be in favour of the hospital - not housing - a dreadful place to live next to the M4.

The site is needed as a stop gap for pollution. I would welcome the site populated with trees and other life that will create a barrier to the M4 traffic and pollution. It is also important for demarcation between Holyport and Maidenhead. Also as recent events have proved, that area is needed as a flood plain.

Apart from air pollution I believe there would be a considerable increase in noise pollution should further development take place on these sites. I reside in Priors Way and it is already impossible to have open windows, particularly at night with the noise from the M4 motorway and the A308. Further development within this area would increase this noise pollution to an unbearable level. Indeed there is far more noise from traffic than aircraft!!!

I support the hospital plan and accept that it would be impossible to find a Brownfield site large enough and sufficiently well located for access

The increase in traffic will cause more threat to pedestrians

There is also a lot of wildlife on the site including deer, where would they go, there is nowhere else left for them!

If we get rid of all our farming land how will we eat?

I don't live in Maidenhead town because I value the green areas around Holyport. Filling these in destroys the feel of Holyport, and I might as well live in central Maidenhead. Filling the areas with houses gives all the downside of living in central Maidenhead, with none of the benefits (e.g. close to station)

Generally the traffic in the area is already at saturation point so any major building that brought further traffic would have a seriously detrimental effect on the residents ability to get in or out of the village at peak times. This is a constant thorn to me and can effectively double the length of my journey into and out of London, often taking over 30 minutes to get out of the village.

Increased traffic would pose a greater risk to pedestrians and cyclists and also significantly increase commuting journey times (which would increase carbon emissions due to gridlock) with a resulting negative impact on the economy.

We support only LIMITED development on this site. Large parts of the site need to remain as present for necessary drainage and protection against flooding for the existing houses.

We strongly believe that despite ever-present pressure to build housing, we must ensure that access to countryside and open space is available to the next and future generations. We also believe it is vital to maintain green areas around all built up areas to assist in managing ground-water in both flood and drought situations.

Populations rise and fall, but once land is built on it's lost. Green Belt should never be built on, there are many other options.

Any loss of Green Belt is to be deplored but a hospital is a necessary thing, especially if Wexham and Heatherwood close.

Open spaces are vital for the well-being of a community. As it is, there are few enough of these open spaces in Holyport and for that reason alone, we should not infill wherever there is a plot of land. Also, I feel extremely strongly that wildlife should be allowed to exist alongside people. With the pressure on land in this area, some species are struggling - I have noticed that there are fewer birds around and rarely do I see hares nowadays when out walking.

I live right where the Ascot Road narrows and you would not believe how many times I have had to pick up bits of cars where they have passed each other and hit their wing mirrors etc ... If there are any needs for hospitals, please do not close the existing ones... you might invest in the existing developed hospitals... rather than having families rushing their kids to Wexham Park hospital... rather than having adequate facilities at St Marks hospital in Maidenhead.

I think that Holyport should stay as a village. Maidenhead has plenty of undeveloped areas and brown-field sites that would benefit the town with updated housing. Better access to shops and travel. With the advent of the Crossrail link from Maidenhead to London it is important that developments occur near the train station to reduce road congestion and parking issues. Also the outer lying areas such as Holyport may become more desirable in the property market if left untouched.
